Welly Racks, sponsored by Graham Heath



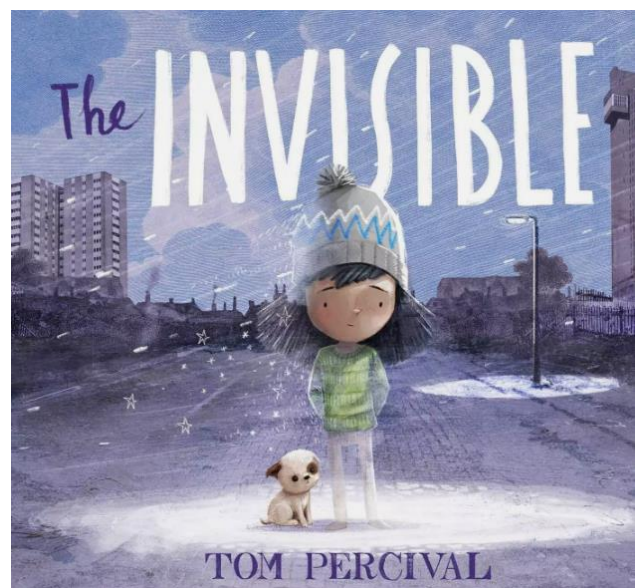
